



ChinaAid* Prayer Requests for the Persecuted— Winter 2021

- ❑ **1. ChinaAid** - ChinaAid is an international non-profit Christian human rights organization committed to promoting religious freedom and the rule of law in China. ChinaAid believes that religious freedom is the first freedom, which lays the foundation for all other basic human rights. Pray for power for ChinaAid to continue to **expose** the systematic persecution, harassment, torture and imprisonment of Chinese Christians and human rights lawyers in China; **encourage** the abused by financially supporting Chinese Christians and their families who have experienced persecution by the Chinese government; and **equip** the leaders by providing leadership and rule of law training for Christian and church leaders in China to defend their rights under both Chinese constitutional law and international law.
 - ❑ **2. ChinaAid Board, Staff and Partners** - Pray for physical protection, unity, and growth in the Lord for each of ChinaAid's partner organizations as they work together to further the cause of Christ, as well as for the individual members of ChinaAid's staff. Pray for wisdom for each of their board members as they lead and advise the organization.
 - ❑ **3. Bob Fu** - Bob Fu, president of ChinaAid, was imprisoned in China in the 1990s for "illegal evangelism". After his release, he and his wife escaped to the U.S. as religious refugees where he founded ChinaAid. Pray for wisdom for Bob as he works with various governmental leaders and organizations and various persecution cases. Ask God for protection—he has had bomb threats, personal death warnings, been lied about in publications, and has been exiled from his home in the U.S. under FBI protection. Ask God to give him wisdom and strength and encouragement as he advocates for the persecuted in China.
 - ❑ **4. Chinese Persecuted** - Pray for those who are being persecuted, imprisoned, or kept in "enforced disappearance" [but not forgotten] for their faith in Jesus Christ. Ask God to encourage and strengthen their faith. Ask God to use them (even in prison) to draw more people to himself.
 - ❑ **5. Alimujiang Yimiti** - Pray for Alimujiang Yimiti, a Uyghur Christian, who has been illegally detained and held in prison for since 2008. On Dec 7, 2009, the Kashgar District Intermediate Court notified Alimujiang's lawyer that he had been sentenced to a fixed-term imprisonment of 15 years for "unlawfully providing state secrets to overseas organizations." Ask God to encourage him and give him a sense of His presence.
 - ❑ **6. Pastor Sanqiang "John" Cao** - Pray for Pastor John Cao, who was sentenced to seven years in prison in March 2018 on the charge of "organizing illegal border crossings." His wife and 2 sons are U.S. Citizens and he is a legal resident of North Carolina. Pray he would stand strong in his faith and find favor with authorities. Ask God to protect and encourage him.
 - ❑ **7. Pastor Wang Yi** and his wife Jiang Rong were arrested along with 160 members of their church (Early Rain Covenant Church) in December 2018. In June 2019, Yi's wife was released on bail and kept under surveillance without visitors. Pastor Wang Yi was sentenced to nine years in prison on December 30th, 2019, days after a sudden and secret trial on December 26th. Pastor Wang was found guilty of "inciting subversion of state power" and "illegal business operations." He says of those holding him, "...May the Lord use me, and give me patience and wisdom, that I may bring the Gospel to them." Ask God to protect, encourage and strengthen Pastor Yi's faith and to broaden his ministry (even in prison).
 - ❑ **8. Elder Hu Shigen**, a pro-democracy activist and renowned church elder, was sentenced to seven-and-a-half years in prison on August 3, 2016, based on falsified charges of "subversion of state power." Pray for his health, encouragement and faith.
 - ❑ **9. Elder Qin Defu** of Early Rain Covenant Church is currently serving a four-year prison sentence for his involvement with the church. He was arrested in December 2018 amid a mass crackdown on the church and charged with "illegal business operations." Pray for the leaders and 700 believers of ERCC to have God's peace, courage and God's comfort.
 - ❑ **10. Dr. Xu Zhiyong** - Well-known legal activist and civil rights lawyer Xu Zhiyong was arrested in February 2020, charged with "inciting subversion of state power." He was released in 2017 after serving a four-year sentence for legal activism. Pray that God will encourage him and protect him.

- ❑ **11. Pastor Zhang Shaojie**, of Nanle County Christian Church in Henan province, is currently serving a 12-year prison term for “gathering a crowd to disrupt the public order” and a fabricated fraud charge. Pray that he would be fruitful as he preaches to fellow-prisoners and that the prisoners caring for him in his cell would come to know Christ. Pray for spiritual encouragement and for improved physical and mental health (he suffered much.) Also pray for encouragement, endurance of his daughter Esther Zhang, who fled to the US with her husband and daughter.
- ❑ **12. China’s President Xi and those in the Chinese Government** - Please pray President Xi and other government officials would come to know Christ and God would soften their hearts. Pray that they listen to the wisdom of the Lord and not lies of the enemy.
- ❑ **13. China’s Secret Police and Police Officers** – Please pray they will have encounters with Christ via people, dreams or scripture.
- ❑ **14. ChinaAid Partners** - Please pray for peace, protection, and power for current and future brothers and sisters in the faith of Jesus Christ as well as for prayer partners and supporters of ChinaAid.
- ❑ **15. Writing Campaign** – Pray that people would write letters to prisoners of conscience to provide encouragement and send a signal to prison officials that there are people all over the world who are invested in the safety and well-being of these unjustly imprisoned Chinese citizens. Alimujiang Yimiti, a Uyghur Christian house church leader, was criminally detained on Jan. 12, 2008, for “inciting separatism” and “unlawfully providing state secrets to overseas organizations” and formally arrested on Feb. 20. The detainment followed an accusation of “engaging in illegal religious infiltration activities in Kashgar, spreading Christianity among the Uyghurs, and distributing religious propaganda materials to increase the number of Christians” by the Kashgar Municipal Commission of Ethics and Religious Affairs on Sept. 13, 2007. Alimujiang’s first lawyer was turned away, and it wasn’t until April 18, 2008, that a lawyer was able to meet with him. He was tried in secret on May 27, 2008; his family, including his wife and two sons, was barred from attending. At the trial, it was concluded that there was insufficient evidence to convict Alimujiang of divulging state secrets, causing the case to be turned back over to the Kashgar police for further investigation. Alimujiang was again charged with “unlawfully providing state secrets to overseas organizations” on July 11, 2009, after more than a year in detention with no formal verdict. The separatism charge was dropped without explanation. On July 28, 2009, the Kashgar Intermediate People’s Court conducted a second secret trial, once again barring Alimujiang’s family from attending. The hearing was left without a verdict, and Alimujiang was finally convicted and sentenced to a 15-year prison term on Aug. 6, 2009. Alimujiang’s wife and lawyer didn’t learn of the trial until October 2009, and it wasn’t until December 2009 that they learned Alimujiang’s sentence. On Sept. 12, 2008, the UN Working Group on Arbitrary Detention declared that Alimujiang’s detention was arbitrary and based solely on his “religious faith and religious activities.” Alimujiang was born on June 10, 1973, in Hami, Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region. Pastor John Cao served as a missionary in Myanmar’s Wa State, transforming the lives of more than 2,000 impoverished minority children by building 16 schools and worked to fight poverty in the region. Chinese officials knew that he repeatedly crossed the border between China and Myanmar because of his work and allowed him to do so for three years. However, on March 5, 2017, authorities in China’s Yunnan province intercepted Cao and his colleague, Jing Ruxia, and placed them in prison on illegal border crossing charges, despite the fact that they had never had trouble before. Later, they changed Cao’s charge to “organizing illegal border crossings,” and he was sentenced to seven years in prison in March 2018. Cao is married to an American citizen, Jamie Powell, and is a legal resident of North Carolina. When faced with the option of obtaining American citizenship, he chose not to so as to better be able to serve the persecuted Chinese church. Those observing Cao’s case believe that his imprisonment does not come from the violation of any border law, but rather arose from China’s ongoing campaign to suppress the Chinese church.

Hu Shigen, a pro-democracy activist and renowned church elder, currently waits out a seven-and-a-half year sentence on falsified charges of “subversion of state power.” Following his graduation from China’s elite Peking University, Hu took a professorial position within the capital. In the wake of the notorious Tiananmen Square crackdown, when the Communist Party massacred groups of pro-democracy students and advocates who had converged in front of an ancient royal palace to call for political reform, Hu joined a fledgling political movement. When China tried to stifle news of the violence, Hu helped plan to disseminate fliers on the tragedy’s third anniversary and served 16 years in prison for leading a so-called “counterrevolutionary ring.” Following his incarceration, he led several underground churches and served as an elder. Hu vanished during a nationwide crackdown on human rights defenders on July 9, 2015. On Jan. 8, 2016, his family received an arrest notice stating that authorities suspected him of “subversion of state power.” Using a picture of his baptism as evidence of his supposed guilt, a court convicted him and sentenced him to seven-and-a-half years in prison on Aug. 3, 2016.

Pastor Zhang Shaojie, of Nanle County Christian Church in China’s central Henan, is currently serving a 12-year prison term for “gathering a crowd to disrupt the public order” and a fabricated fraud charge. He was initially detained on Nov. 16, 2013, when authorities asked to meet with him at his church. Instead, authorities bound Zhang, who served as the local head of the China Christian Council and Three-Self Patriotic Movement, and took him into custody. Authorities detained more than 20 church members, spanning from the day before Zhang’s detention to several days after his detention. The cause of the persecution is said to be a land dispute between the Nanle County government and the church, about which the church sent several groups to Beijing to petition higher authorities there after being unsatisfied with the outcome at the local level. Heavy persecution of the church continued well into the summer of 2014. On July 4, 2014, Zhang was sentenced to 12 years in prison for his charges despite his lawyers’ arguments, which included the fact that police had essentially kidnapped the alleged victim of Zhang’s fraud case. On Aug. 21, the Puyang Intermediate People’s Court rejected Zhang’s final appeal, leaving him with almost no chance of justice. His lawyers’ had repeatedly asked for a different court to hear the appeal due to the clear corruption of the Puyang Intermediate People’s Court to no avail. Zhang was 49 years old at the time of his detention.
